CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course is a continuation of Clinic I; continued advancement of clinical competencies. The students will be provided opportunities to refine previously learned skills. Emphasis will be placed on root planing, topical medical application, preparation of study casts, placement of sealants, periodontal charting, local anesthetic, and treatment of patients with special oral needs. Clinical experiences are arranged in the dental hygiene clinic and extra-mural rotations.

- VIII. Each student must complete competency skill evaluations for each of the following procedures:
 - a. cleaning removable appliances
 - b. subgingival irrigation (minimum 3 areas, 4 mm pocketing or greater)
 - c. comprehensive treatment plan on one (1) Level III or Level IV patient
 - d. using periodontal probe for Level III patient or IV patient
 - e. using ultrasonic scaler
 - f. placing pit and fissure sealants
 - g. universal curettes; Gracey curettes; sickle scaler
 - h. self assessment
 - i. imp/study models on peers
 - j. dietary counseling
 - k. local anesthetic
