CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

Introduction to the basics of the language, with emphasis on speaking and listening skills. Provides basic conversational patterns, idiomatic vocabulary, basic grammar and syntax, and general cultural patterns. Recommended for prospective language majors and those with vocational interests.

In the majority of instances, this course will transfer only as a general elective for the B.A. degree or for other baccalaureate degrees requiring a world language.

COURSE TOPICS AND CONTENT REQUIREMENTS:

1. Study of:
 - a. The situations encountered while traveling in the culture.
 - b. The necessities of everyday communication therein.
 - c. The idiomatic communication with native speakers.
 - d. The more precise needs of the classroom, formal settings.
 - e. Basic word forms.
 - f. Basic grammar, syntax, conversational patterns.
2. Expansion of vocabulary.
3. Expanded materials to progress from a general examination of the cultural situation to specialized interests of students, for example: travel, arts, business transactions, systems of communications, formal language study per se, reading for variety of purposes.
4. Materials of topical nature are selected to meet the needs of the students in specialized areas as well as to provide general supplements to the selected text(s).

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

1. Dialogues on specific topics are used to expand vocabulary, basic grammar and syntax, and cultural situations.
2. CD's are used for listening practices.
3. Lectures are given for general knowledge.
4. Drills on grammar, language patterns, and vocabulary.
5. Homework is given on preparation of such dialogues and drills.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS AND METHODS OF EVALUATION:

- a. Students are required to prepare one chapter of text per class.
- b. Dialogues and pattern practices.
- c. Oral and written exercises.
- d. Quizzes and examinations.
- e. Reading assignments on supplementary material.
- f. Attend classes regularly.
