<u>Catalogue Description:</u> this is an introductory course that deals with the analysis and description of human behavior with special reference to the history of psychology, research methods, biological psychology, cognitive psychology, learning theory and memory, perceptual processes, developmental psychology, personality, abnormal/clinical psychology and social psychology. Emphasis is placed upon psychological principles as they relate to daily life.

Course Objectives:

General psychology provides broad coverage of important and representative areas in psychology that are concerned with human behavior and mental processes. This course focuses on human and animal behavior and provides students and provides students with the frame-work for developing a better understanding of their own behavior, the behavior of others, and how mental processes work and effect human behavior. As student progress through the course they shall begin to develop a critical understanding of human behavior and human relations from the perspective of psychology. Upon completion of this course, students shall be able to:

- 1. Use psychological words, terms, and their meanings.
- 2. Explain psychological theories of topics covered.
- 3. Understand the behavior of themselves and others.
- 4. Have a general knowledge of the history and development of psychology as a field of study.
 - 5. Have an introduction to many aspects of psychological study.

6. Be familiar with research and assessment techniques.

Attendance: Class attendance is required. Attendance and class participation are vital to the discussion of human behavior and, therefore, are figured into the evaluation policy. Excessive absences (6+) could result in instructor-initiated withdrawal from the course. Students must attend a minimum of 2/3 of scheduled class sessions (20 or 30, as the case may be) to pass. No one can leave class early.

If a student misses class, lecture notes must be obtained from fellow class participants, please quickly make a contact in class to serve this function.

<u>Punctuality - Please arrive to class on time:</u> Frequently, important instructions will be given at the beginning of class. Also, late arrivals are distracting for the rest of class. Excessive tardiness can have an adverse effect on grades by counting as absences.

<u>Tests:</u> There will be four (4) tests as listed on the tentative class schedule. Exam questions may include, but are not limited to: multiple choice, true-false and short answer/essay. Exams will count for the majority of the semester's points.

I will determine your final grade by dropping the lowest of your three major test scores (excepting the final) and then averaging the two scores, to come up with your average test score. The final will count no more than the other test scores and is not cumulative. **YOU MUST TAKE (and pass) THE FINAL EXAM.** If you skip the final, I will average your first scores and then lower your grade by one letter. If you fail the final, (score less than 60), it will count, even if it is the lowest score.

<u>Make-Up Exam Policy:</u> You may not make-up tests. If you miss an exam your grade is simply determined by the average of your other exam scores. Special make-up arrangements will be made if you have to miss the final. Obviously, if you miss an exam, it will constitute your "lowest" test score.

<u>Final Grade:</u> The final grade will be determined by totaling question, quiz, project and test scores in the following proportions:

Class participation will be assessed. Students will be given questions relating to the material to be discussed in class and should be prepared to respond to said questions.

Students may be called upon with respect to said material. If students are unable to respond to said questions they can count on being called on again.

Your ultimate grade for the course will be assessed as follows:

<u>Quizzes:</u> On approximately twenty (20) designated occasions, short quizzes shall be assigned on the reading material for class. Said quizzes will constitute 15% of the final grade for the class. Students **must** attend the class for which the quiz is assigned to receive credit. **No make-ups.**

<u>Mental Disorder Paper and Perception Quiz</u>: Supplements to this syllabus will discuss these assignments.
