COURSE DESCRIPTION

English Composition I allows the student to study and apply rhetorical principles of writing in developing effective sentences, paragraphs, and essays, with particular emphasis on analyzing and writing expository prose. Students' essays will be based upon their readings of a variety of texts on various topics. The course includes the use of various computer applications, including word-processing and the Internet. <u>Credit Hours</u>: 3. <u>Division</u>: Humanities, Fine Arts, and Social Sciences. <u>IAI Code</u>: C1 900. <u>Prerequisites</u>: English and Reading placement according to the Illinois Valley Community College Course Placement Guide (www.ivcc.edu/assessmentcenter/IVCC_AC_PlacementGrid.pdf). Successful completion of Orientation to Distance Learning (CSP-0002).

EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES AND GENERAL EDUCATION GOALS

- 1. Read a variety of texts with understanding and appreciation.
- 2. Understand invention as a part of the writing process.
- 3. Organize and develop ideas effectively and logically in essays.
- 4. Develop effective, logical, and well-supported arguments.
- 5. Understand and use a variety of rhetorical methods for developing ideas.
- 6. Maintain a consistent and appropriate viewpoint, tone, and voice.
- 7. Strengthen essays through the revision process.
- 8. Write essays free of common stylistic weaknesses.
- 9. Write essays free of excessive errors.
- 10. Use word-processing software and the Internet to assist in the writing process.
- 11. Understand documentation and plagiarism.

This course addresses the following IVCC general education goals: 1) to apply analytical and problem solving skills to personal, social and professional issues and situations, 2) to communicate successfully, both orally and in writing, to a variety of audiences, and 3) to understand and use technology effectively and to understand its impact on the individual and society.

Access to the Internet

You should be able to access the Internet through a browser such as Google Chrome or Firefox. This requirement is necessary to access your student e-mail and all of our class resources, including our Blackboard and our class Zoom meetings. Access to Zoom and a Webcam

You will need to access Zoom, our teleconferencing tool, to attend the required class meetings. You do not need to purchase Zoom. You will be given a Zoom link for both our class and my office hours, both of which you should be able to access through regular Internet access. A webcam is needed because you will be required to have that camera on and showing live video of yourself during class to be counted as attending class.

You are required to submit final drafts of Essays 1-5 as attached files through Blackboard and SafeAssign, Blackboard's plagiarism detection service. These final drafts must be submitted by the end of the day (midnight) on the due dates. The **late penalty for Essays 1-5 will be 5% for each 24-hour period, starting at the due date and time.** Due dates and times for rewrites of Essays 1-4 will be announced. Essay 1 and Essay 2 rewrite grades will replace the original grades (except for any original late penalty); Essay 3 and Essay 4 rewrite grades will be averaged with the original grades. The rewrites must be submitted through Blackboard/SafeAssign by the end of the day (midnight) on the due dates, with the same 5% late penalty applied for each 24-hour period. You will not have an opportunity to rewrite Essay 5.

Essays submitted through Blackboard that cannot be opened because of technical problems may still be considered late. Instructions will be provided for submitting through Blackboard, and it is then your responsibility to make sure your files have been submitted correctly and can be opened from Blackboard. You must submit final drafts of all five essays to pass this course (though doing so does not guarantee a passing grade). In addition, in the case of consistently below-average writing (D or F level), I reserve the right to base your course grade solely upon the quality of your graded essays. Students must earn a C or better in this class for it count as part of an IVCC transfer degree and/or as a course accepted by an Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI) institution. Your essays will be graded according to the standards outlined in the *Stylebook*, based on the following scale:

ESSAY DRAFTS (50 POINTS)

Because we will be emphasizing the whole writing process, including invention and rewriting, you will be required to submit drafts of Essays 2-4 before submitting final drafts for grading. To earn full credit, each draft must be typed, meet the minimum essay length requirement (plus a Works Cited page when required), and <u>submitted by the beginning of class time on the due date through Blackboard/SafeAssign</u>. An incomplete draft will earn only partial credit. A late draft submitted within 24 hours of the due date and time will earn half the assigned credit. Any draft submitted more than 24 hours late will earn no credit. You are expected to revise and edit your drafts thoroughly and carefully before

submitting them as final drafts for grading. In addition to participating in class workshops, discussing your drafts with me and utilizing the Writing Center are excellent strategies.

OTHER ASSIGNMENTS (100 POINTS)

Other assignments may include discussion questions, grammar exercises, quizzes, group assignments, and so forth. <u>An inclass assignment (including a group assignment) may be completed for credit only during the class period when it is assigned. Unless noted otherwise, out-of-class assignments will be due by the end of the day (midnight) on the due dates. Late out-of-class assignments submitted within 24 hours of the due date and time will earn half the assigned credit. Any out-of-class assignments submitted more than 24 hours late will earn no credit.</u>

MAKE-UP POLICY (EXTRA CREDIT)

You may earn back 30 missed points by reading <u>a short story</u> that you find online (one that we did not read or discuss in class in any way) and type a <u>one-page, double-spaced</u> summary/critique of that story. Your summary should <u>include the author, title, the actual link to the story, a plot summary, and the names of main characters</u>. Your critique should be what you liked/disliked, what you learned, what you found interesting, and/or anything else that shows me you thought about the story. **Your writing must be your own, original work and ideas. Of course, any submission that contains plagiarism will not earn any points.** Your summaries/critiques do not need to be in MLA format or use a formal style (using "I" is acceptable), but they should be typed and use your best writing. <u>As long as they are written carefully and thoroughly (and are a full page long), you will earn 10 points for each one</u>. Submit your extra credit as attached files through Blackboard under the Extra Credit assignment under the Assignments link. This assignment is set up by default to accept three submissions, so you may use the same assignment to submit all three of your extra credit submissions separately and at different times. <u>Extra credit will only be accepted through the end of the day (midnight) on the last regularly scheduled class meeting day before the final exam.</u>

ATTENDANCE POLICY

This class is blended, delivered entirely online, but with regularly scheduled class meetings through Zoom and Blackboard. Regular attendance at these class meetings is important to passing this course. Just as with any class, you are expected to join the Zoom meeting by the start time of class and stay in the Zoom meeting until the end of the class to be counted as attending. When you are absent, you are still responsible for what is covered during your absence and for all assignments, regardless of why you are absent. Though I do not penalize you directly for missing scheduled class meetings, being absent more than a few times almost certainly will lower your grade because of the material and assignments you will miss. I will keep attendance records, which I am required to report to IVCC, including for financial aid purposes.

PARTICIPATION AND CLASSROOM EXPECTATIONS

Your participation in this class not only affects your learning, but that of your fellow students, as well. In addition, the quantity and quality of your contributions to the class may affect your class grade if it is "borderline" at the end of the semester. At all times, your participation and actions should demonstrate respect for the class, your classmates, and the instructor.

You are expected to participate regularly in all class activities, including the following:

- Logging into our class Blackboard every scheduled class day and time
- Attending and participating in all scheduled class meetings through Zoom and Blackboard
- Attending and participating in all assigned small group meetings and activities through Zoom and Blackboard
- Exhibiting professional and respectful behavior. For all Zoom meetings, this means your appearance (including dress) and surrounding background should be appropriate for a college classroom.
- Viewing assigned PowerPoints and other presentations
- Reading the textbook and other assigned resources
- Submitting all assignments on time

I'll check Blackboard and my e-mail each weekday that IVCC is open and possibly other days, depending on assignments, questions, etc. I'll try to respond to questions within 24 hours during the week and no later than on Monday for questions

sent to me over the weekend. My goal is to return graded assignments to you within one to two weeks after their due dates, if not sooner.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

This course and all the work you submit for it are subject to IVCC's Academic Integrity Policy, which is available in the current *IVCC Catalog* and *Student Handbook*. Everything that you submit for this class must be your own work. If any of your work includes any material from a source, you must give full credit to the source. In other words, that material must be fully documented. **Submitting work that is not your own and failing to document source material are both plagiarism, a form of cheating. Plagiarism and cheating in general can destroy your credibility as a writer and are grounds for failing an assignment in this course and/or the entire course**. Refer to the *IVCC Stylebook* for more information on plagiarism. In addition, you are not allowed to submit work that you completed prior to this class or are working on for another class (for example, for another college course or in high school) without my prior approval. Please discuss with me any concerns you have about these issues.

WITHDRAWAL POLICY

You may withdraw from this course through November 4. Students have the ability to initiate a withdrawal from classes. By completing the form in the Records Office or through the form located within WebAdvisor, the student is authorizing IVCC to remove him/her from the course. Entering the student ID number serves as the student's electronic signature. IVCC has the right to rescind a withdrawal in cases of academic dishonesty or at the instructor's discretion. Students should be aware of the impact of a withdrawal on full-time status for insurance purposes and for financial aid. It is highly recommended that students meet with their instructor or with a counselor before withdrawing from a class to discuss if a withdrawal is the best course of action for that particular student.
