### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

English Composition II continues the study and application of rhetorical principles of expository writing in developing effective sentences, paragraphs, and essays—with particular emphasis on analyzing and writing expository prose. Students' essays will be based upon their readings of literature and other texts. The library research writing will be developed from those readings. The course includes the use of various computer applications, including word-processing and the Internet. <u>Credit Hours</u>: 3. <u>Division</u>: Humanities, Fine Arts, and Social Sciences. <u>IAI Code</u>: C1 901R. <u>Prerequisite</u>: Successful completion of ENG 1001.

### EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Read works of literature and other texts with understanding and appreciation.
- 2. Understand invention as a part of the writing process.
- 3. Organize and develop ideas effectively and logically in essays.
- 4. Develop effective, logical, and well-supported arguments.
- 5. Understand and use a variety of rhetorical methods for developing ideas.
- 6. Maintain a consistent and appropriate viewpoint, tone, and voice.
- 7. Strengthen essays through the revision process.
- 8. Write essays free of common stylistic weaknesses.
- 9. Write essays free of excessive errors.
- 10. Use word-processing software and the Internet to assist in the writing process.
- 11. Understand the principles of research.
- 12. Understand the use, citation, and documentation of sources.
- 13. Understand strategies for developing and writing research papers.

This course also addresses IVCC's institutional learning outcomes. For outcomes shared by English Composition I (ENG 1001) and English Composition II (ENG 1002), students are expected to demonstrate a more sophisticated level of understanding and ability in English Composition II than in English Composition I.

# FORMAL GRADED WRITING (800 POINTS)

You are required to submit final drafts of all the formal graded writing assignments as attached files through Blackboard and SafeAssign, Blackboard's plagiarism detection service. <u>Final drafts must be submitted by midnight on their due dates</u>. **The late penalty for these assignments will be 5% for each 24-hour period, starting at the due date and time.** 

Specific due dates and times for rewrites of the Research Proposal and Research Paper will be announced. **The Research Proposal rewrite is required**. The final grades for the Research Proposal and Research Paper will be the average of the original and rewrite grades for each assignment. <u>The rewrites must be submitted through Blackboard/SafeAssign by</u> <u>midnight on their due dates</u>, with the same 5% late penalty applied for each 24-hour period. You will not have an opportunity to rewrite the Literary Analysis Essay.

Your essays will be graded according to the *Stylebook* standards and the following scale:

#### **Other Important Notes:**

- Consistent with IVCC's transfer agreement with other state colleges and universities (Illinois Articulation Initiative), a student who earns a failing grade on the Research Paper cannot earn higher than a D in the course; in addition, a student must earn at least a C in the course for it to transfer.
- You must submit all three formal graded writing assignments and the Research Proposal rewrite to pass this course (though doing so does not guarantee a passing grade); in addition, in the case of consistently below-average writing (D or F level), I reserve the right to base your course grade solely upon the quality of your formal graded writing assignments.
- Essays submitted through Blackboard that cannot be opened because of technical problems may still be considered late. Instructions will be provided for submitting through Blackboard, and it is then your responsibility to make sure your files have been submitted correctly and can be opened from Blackboard.

# **ESSAY DRAFTS (75 POINTS)**

Because we will be emphasizing the whole writing process, including invention and rewriting, you will be required to submit drafts of the formal graded writing assignments before submitting final drafts for grading. To earn full credit, each draft must be typed, meet the length requirement (including a Works Cited page when required), and <u>be submitted by the start of class on its due date through Blackboard/SafeAssign</u>. You also may be asked to provide a printed copy of drafts for in-class workshops, which also will be due at the start of class. An incomplete draft will earn only partial credit. A late draft submitted within 24 hours of the due date and time will earn half the assigned credit. Any draft submitted more than 24 hours late will earn no credit. You are expected to revise and edit your drafts thoroughly and carefully before submitting them as final drafts for grading. In addition to participating in class workshops, discussing your drafts with me and utilizing the Writing Center are excellent strategies.

# **OTHER ASSIGNMENTS (125 POINTS)**

Other assignments may include discussion questions, grammar exercises, quizzes, group assignments, pre-writing work, and so forth. <u>These assignments must be submitted in the required format by the specified due date and time to receive</u> full credit. Some of these assignments may be completed only in class when they are assigned, including quizzes, and may

<u>not be made up</u>. All other assignments submitted within 24 hours of the due date and time will earn half the assigned credit (no points if received more than 24 hours late).

# MAKE-UP POLICY (EXTRA CREDIT)

You may earn back missed points by reading <u>a short story</u> that you find online (one that we did not read or discuss in class in any way) and type a <u>one-page</u>, <u>double-spaced</u> summary/critique of that story. Your summary should <u>include the author</u>, <u>title</u>, the actual link to the story, a plot summary, and the names of main characters. Your critique should be what you liked/disliked, what you learned, what you found interesting, and/or anything else that shows me you thought about the story. **Your writing must be your own**, **original work and ideas**. **Of course**, **any submission that contains plagiarism will not earn any points**. Your summaries/critiques do not need to be in MLA format or use a formal style (using "I" is acceptable), but they should be typed and use your best writing. <u>As long as they are written carefully and thoroughly (and are a full page long), you will earn 10 points for each one, up to three submissions total, with a maximum of 30 points. Submit your extra credit as attached files through Blackboard under the Extra Credit assignment under the Assignments link. This assignment is set up by default to accept three submissions, so you may use the same assignment to submit all three of your extra credit submissions separately and at different times. **Extra credit will only be accepted through the end of the day (midnight) on May 4.**</u>

# ATTENDANCE POLICY

Regular attendance is important to passing this course. When you are absent, you are still responsible for what is covered in class during your absence and for all assignments, regardless of why you are absent. Though I do not penalize you directly for missing class, being absent more than a few times almost certainly will lower your grade because of the material and assignments you will miss.

# PARTICIPATION AND CLASSROOM EXPECTATIONS

Consistent with IVCC policy, you are required to wear a face mask in this class unless you have been granted an exemption from the Vice President for Student Services. - Submitting all assignments on time. Doing so does not guarantee an extension, which will depend on when you contacted me, the specific circumstances, and possibly documentation (for example, a doctor's note).

To give everyone an equal opportunity to learn, it's vital that your participation and actions during class contribute to an effective learning environment. The following activities detract from such an environment and will not be tolerated:

- Arriving to class late, leaving and coming back during class, or leaving class early
- Checking e-mail, playing online games, or visiting any non-course websites
- Using the printer during class presentations or discussion
- Texting, allowing your phone to ring, or using your phone during class
- Logging into or studying for other courses and conversation or any other activity unrelated to class

I'll check Blackboard and e-mail each weekday that IVCC is open and possibly other days, depending on assignments, etc. I'll try to respond to questions within 24 hours during the week and no later than Monday for questions sent to me over the weekend. My goal is to return graded assignments to you within one to two weeks after their due dates, if not sooner.

Please take advantage of my office hours and my availability before and after class to talk to me about a specific writing assignment or the class in general. I'm available outside of class, and I'm pleased to help you with the class in any way I reasonably can. If necessary, we can arrange in-person or Zoom meetings at times other than my scheduled office hours. Get your money's worth out of your instructors, your classes, and the other services IVCC offers its students.

# **ACADEMIC INTEGRITY**

Everything that you submit for this class must be your own work. Please discuss with me any concerns you have about these issues.
